OSHA Training Institute (OTI) Education Centers Revised Instructor Minimum Qualifications (Revised May 7, 2018)

Listed below are the minimum qualifications that all qualified instructors must meet *before* they can teach an OTI Education Center course. OTI Education Centers may add additional requirements as required by their institution. OTI Education Centers are not authorized to waive or grant "equivalent credit" for these requirements.

- 1. A Qualified Instructor is defined as an instructor who teaches more than 10% of the course contact hours.
- 2. A Guest Instructor is defined as an instructor who teaches 10% or less of the course contact hours.

Please note that guest instructors may not comprise more than 20% of the course contact hours for any given course.

OTI Education Centers are required to document that each Qualified Instructor meets the minimum requirements listed below. OTI Education Centers must provide this documentation to OSHA upon request.
